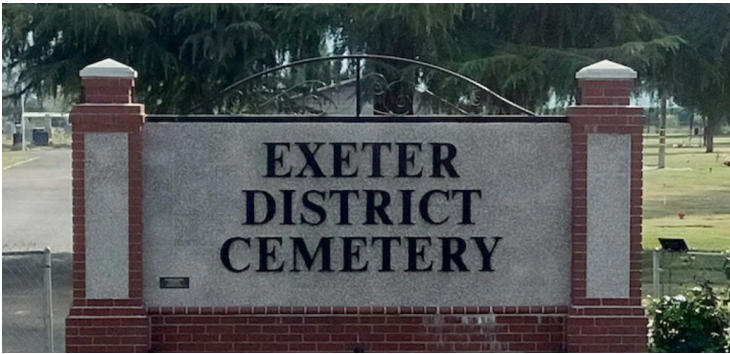


Tales of Exeter and Beyond

“In this world, nothing can be said to be certain except death and taxes.” The famous quote by Benjamin Franklin is a springboard for Dwight Miller’s upcoming *Tales of Exeter and Beyond* history talk, “Death & Taxes.” Miller will discuss the Exeter Public Cemetery District and the need for our tax dollars to sustain it.

Contrary to popular belief, the Exeter Cemetery District includes three cemeteries: one in Exeter, Deep Creek (north of Farmersville), and Hamilton (northeast of Exeter). The Exeter cemetery began in 1896 with the Maxon family and contains over 8,000 burials. Deep Creek is the oldest in Tulare County, with the earliest burial in 1861 and a total of 560 burials. Hamilton is next in age and is a very unique place, way off the beaten path, and home to 300 burials.

The discussion is scheduled for Monday, August 26 at 5:30 p.m. in the upstairs conference room at CACHE. The public is welcome to attend this free event. \$5 donations are encouraged.

Miller Highlights Joe Doctor

In addition to Board President Dwight Miller’s quarterly history talks at CACHE, he will also be publishing a monthly article in the Exeter Chamber of Commerce’s newsletter under “Exeter History Tellers.” His first article will be about the renowned Joe Doctor.

Joe Doctor, who preferred the title Country Journalist, wrote for *The Exeter Sun* (now *The Sun-Gazette*) for more than 30 years. He was a prolific writer and historian who “was able to weave words, facts, and feelings together with ease, entertaining and educating readers all at once,” says local journalist, Lisa McEwen.

Joe graduated from the University of Kansas with a degree in journalism and decided to forgo working for big city newspapers, instead preferring to come back home to Tulare County and write for *The Exeter Sun* and *Visalia-Times Delta*.

A compilation of his *Exeter Sun* columns about Tulare County politics, land, and people has been assembled in the book *Stories from Joe Doctor — Tulare County’s Country Journalist*. It is available for purchase at The Book Garden, located at 189 E. Pine Street in Exeter.
